Nisga'a citizens and businesses are busy working on PRGT... with plans to hire more!

- 4 Nisga'a contractors, plus several joint ventures with Nisga'a Villages and Nisga'a
 Growth Corp
- \$30 million in contracts to Nisga'a businesses
- To date, approx. 32 Nisga'a citizens have been hired
- At 30%, Indigenous participation in PRGT construction is well ahead of other major projects in northern B.C.

PRGT Construction Update

- As of September 14, construction work in the Nass Valley is over 30% complete.
- Workers are starting to move into housing at Nass Camp —taking traffic off the roads. The Nass Camp housing complex is called "Sga Sgin'ist"
- Workers are receiving reminders about right of way on one-way bridges in response to community feedback.

PRGT Rumour vs. Reality

Rumour	Reality
Nisga'a members don't support PRGT or Ksi Lisims LNG.	An NLG survey of over 1000 Nisga'a members shows over 80% support.
Water is being taken from Nisga'a streams for Nass Camp.	Water is being trucked in for camp from Terrace.
PRGT will cost the Nisga'a Nation \$55 Billion.	Money to build these projects comes from investors. No NLG funds are at risk . The Nation expects significant revenue from both PRGT and Ksi Lisims LNG.
Pipeline stream crossings destroy fish habitat.	Research shows we can completely avoid harms to fish by using leading technologies and methods to carefully cross fish habitat.
Pipeline companies are trying to divide Indigenous people.	The Nisga'a Nation owns and is building this project. PRGT has the support of the vast majority of nations along the route.
These projects would raise gas and electricity bills.	There is no evidence to support this claim. Because of these projects, Nisga'a citizens are going to get better, more reliable electricity service.
